Jesus' death in Jn

- The scene of Jesus' death in Jn is notably different from the other gospels.
- Jn's is not tragic (Mk), educative (Lk) or majestic (Mt)
- Jesus dies supremely victorious, forming his community around him, breathing upon it his Spirit and sacramentally birthing, washing and nurturing it in water and blood from his side, the wounds of suffering and death.
- Glory rather than defeat surround a scene replete with ecclesial and spiritfilled motifs
- Birth and life rather than death and disaster characterize this culminating scene.
- This glory does not come at the expense of Jesus' humanity.

Jn 20:1-31

- I. Mary Magdalene, Simon Peter & Beloved Disciple (v1-18)
 - 1-2: Mary Magdalene and the empty tomb
 - 2: Announcement
 - 3-10: Simon Peter & Beloved Disciple to the tomb
 - 11-17: Mary Magdalene encounters Risen Jesus
 - 18: Announcement

John's Passion Narrative

- Jesus' action rather than 'passion'
- Jesus' universal leadership ('King')
- Jesus' Mission: Truth & Authenticity ('Behold...')
- The function of Jesus' "Flesh" (sarx) = expression of humanity
- Death: Victory & Presence
- Moment of Glorification
